




FOOD PANTRY IN-GATHERING



Thank you, thank you, and thank you! God has truly blessed Anna and me in many ways, and one of those blessings is you.




The first quarter to my final year at the seminary has officially started, and boy it has been busy! It's kind of strange being back in the classroom after a year out "in the real world."

Beersheba and up north to Dan. We had the chance to play in the waters of the Dead Sea, Sea of Galilee, and the Mediterranean. We visited the cities of Galilee and were even able to go up to the Western Wall of the Temple Mount.

As you might have heard, I was over there when the cease-fire ended. But we never felt as if we were in danger or in a war zone. We had to go through a lot of security checkpoints and we kept a safe distance from the bad areas. I thank God for keeping us safe and allowing us to visit the land where His people and His Son once walked. I cannot wait for the opportunity to teach what I have learned and experienced.

Anna is working this year at a dancewear shop as well as teaching a dance class for inner city youth at an after school program in South St. Louis. She's been busy. Malachi is growing like a weed and is now 8 months old! He's looking more like daddy every day! I get

to spend a lot of time with him after class while Anna works. I love this time with him since we didn't have a chance to really bond during vicarage. Yet, by the time mommy gets home from work, he cries with joy (he's a mama's boy ③).

Having a baby at home makes studying a little more difficult. I knew it was going to be hard to find time to study, but I never thought life would be this hectic. It's a joyous confusion, I say. I spend my night studying after Malachi goes to bed, which is okay because I'm a "night owl" anyways. He's just the motivation I need to get this work done.

Peacemaking



Over the past few weeks, we have been hearing the names of this year's class of Nobel Prize winners. This prestigious prize was created in November 1895, when Alfred Nobel signed his will, setting up a series of prizes in Physics, Chemistry, Medicine, Literature and Peace. Later, an additional prize was created in Economics. Each year the prize is "distributed annually to those who during the preceding year have conferred the greatest benefit on mankind." But there may also be years when

the prize is not awarded because "If none of the works under consideration is found to be of the importance indicated in the first paragraph, the prize money shall be reserved until the following year."

Of the different categories of the Nobel Prize, the one for peace has often been viewed as the most prestigious, but has been awarded the least. It seems that the world has an abundance of scientists and writers, but not many peacemakers. Few qualify. It is hard to find peacemakers in our world.

The Prince of Peace, Jesus, declares that peacemaking carries the greatest award of all—to be called the children of God. "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God" (Matthew 5:9). But here, we all qualify. Peacemaking is a mark of a disciple of Christ, calming the storms in homes, congregations or wherever we may be found. Having been given peace with God through Christ, you and I are called to reflect that peace to others. May God bless you as He uses you as a peacemaker today.



THE FUTURE OF OUR MINISTRY AMONG HISPANICS IN DENISON

Last month we saw the completion of the first step in our mission goal to become an independent Lutheran congregation affiliated with Iowa District West of the LCMS. We received our certificate of incorporation from the State of Iowa. We thank Zion member and lawyer Rick Franck for donating his time and expertise in preparing this legal document. The name of our new church will be: LA IGLESIA EVANGELICA **LUTERANA AMIGOS EN CRISTO.** In English that is translated: Friends in Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church. We have also written and translated our Constitution and By-Laws and sent it to the Iowa District West's President's office for approval. On Sunday, October 12 we met with our voters to begin studying the Constitution (see picture at right) and to make plans for the future. It's an exciting time. It's also a historic time. Our ministry is celebrating its 15th year of outreach and so it's time to become more organized and structured. But none of our Hispanic members have been through a process like this with lay leadership leading a Christian congregation. Please pray for this historic step in Jesus' church.

THE INSTALLATION OF THE TEACHERS OF ZION

As the new school year started Zion School Principal Tammy Langfield asked if the teachers could also be installed in our Spanish service. They were earlier installed in the Zion services in English. I was more than happy to invite them to a bilingual worship service to celebrate with our Hispanic congregation. On Sunday, September 7, the teachers and staff together with our Hispanic congregation worshipped together (picture at left). This special school has been such a blessing to our ministry among Spanish families. This year we have 10 Hispanic children in the school and 6 from the African country of Sudan. God is bringing the world to Denison and to Zion Lutheran Church and School. It takes special teachers to adjust to these students and their families. We thank the teachers and the staff at Zion School as they teach and minister to all the children of this special school.

MY TYSON CHAPLAINCY AT THE PLANT **IN DENISON**

"Tyson's Annual Chaplains Conference"

The first week of October I went to Springdale, Arkansas for the annual Tyson Chaplains Conference at the international headquarters. In the picture at the right I am with the two other LCMS pastors who also serve as Tyson chaplains: Rev. Eric Moeller of Storm Lake and Rev. Eddie Mekasha of Omaha. Together we gathered with about 80 other Chaplains from the Tyson plants around this country, Mexico and Canada. We participated in the four day conference on how to better serve the workers of Tyson. It was a conference with presentations about the details of the Tyson business side as well as sessions on meeting the spiritual and emotional needs of all plant workers, from management to those who work by the hour. We even prepared meals for the needy of Arkansas. Our group packaged 20,000 bags of food in one hour! It was interesting to visit with the various chaplains of different denominations and to hear about their work situations in the different plants, whether they are pork, chicken or beef plants. The work is much the same at each plant. It's about the people and helping them to use their spiritual faith every day and even at work. We pray that God will continue to open doors to share the Gospel with those in the work place, those in crisis and those searching for the Truth.

If you listen carefully, you may hear the snipping of scissors and the buzzing of sewing machines across Iowa District West as towel kits, quilts, pillowcase dresses and T-shirt shorts are being made. You may also hear young people say, "Wow, this is fun!" as they learn how to use a sewing machine.

Young and old are working together to serve others through many projects.

HATS, crocheted or knitted, for children in Mexico and for the homeless in Iowa and California.

DRESSES made from pillowcases and SHORTS made from T-shirts for children in Haiti.

ETCH (Education To Change Haiti): for \$250 a year, you can sponsor a Haitian child's education. It provides a child's tuition, shoes, books, uniform, backpack and daily meal (if available at the child's school).



TOYS for children in inner city Los Angeles, CA. Along with a toy, the children will hear about God's greatest gift to them—Jesus. Gifts need to be unwrapped, new, for ages 0-14 with a \$5-\$10 value.

BACKPACKS and school supplies for Lewisburg, WV. IOWAY is reaching out to help Christ Our Savior of the Valley Lutheran Church. It is one of only four LCMS churches in the state of West Virginia. Needed are spiral notebooks, erasers,
