On Saturday, November 2nd Daylight Saving Times ends, so remember to set your clocks **BACK** 1 hour before retiring on Saturday evening November 4th.

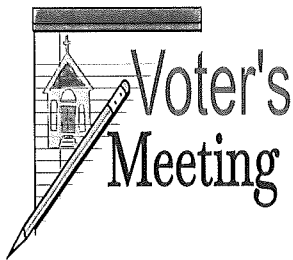

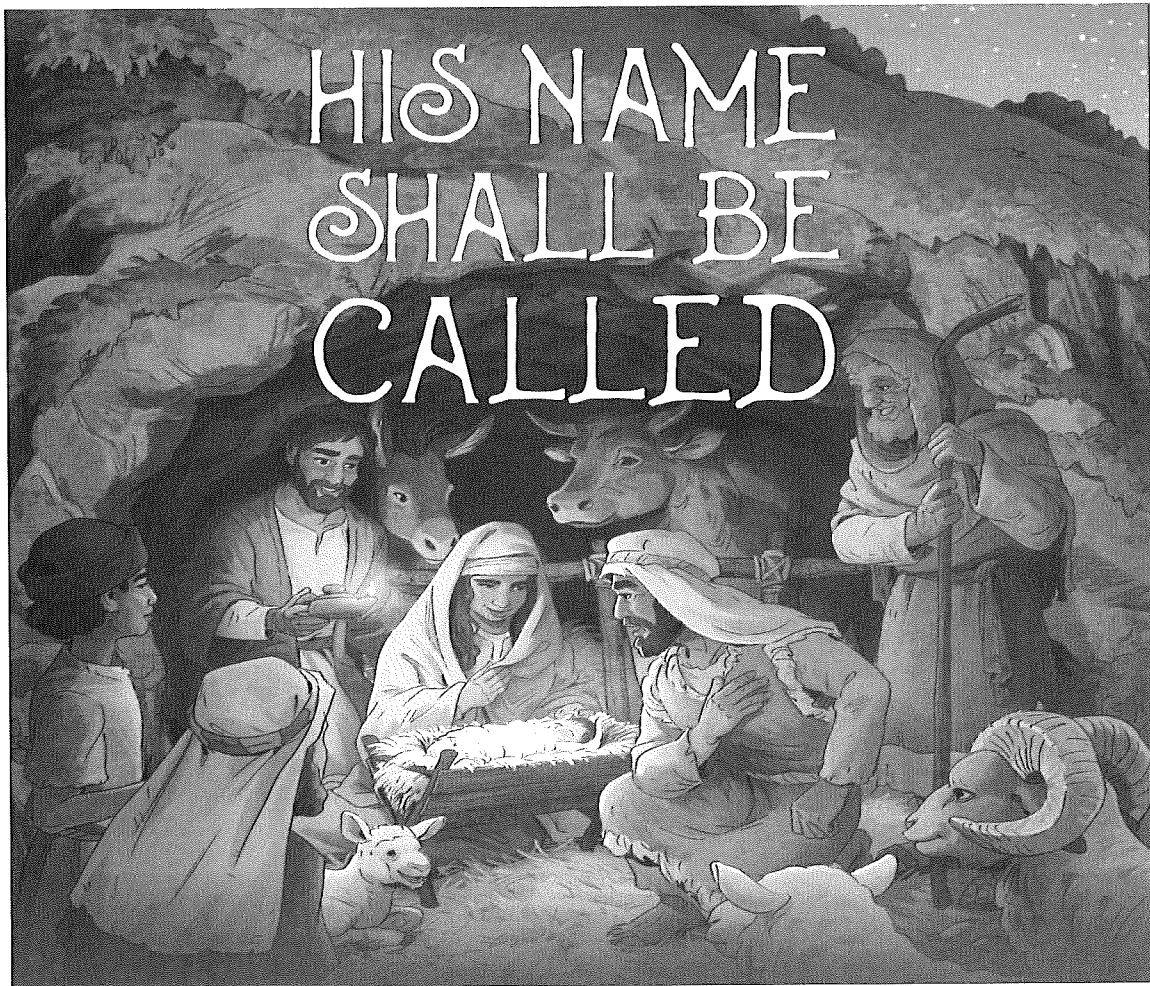

Pastor Edmund Steimle put it this way: "The Christian story is a story of God coming into the middle of life, of our lives, opening the dialogue with us."

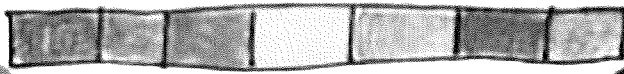
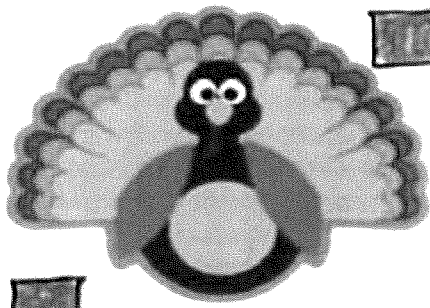
That's what Advent is really all about: God visiting the earth in person to speak with anyone and everyone who is ready to do so.

God's precious saints

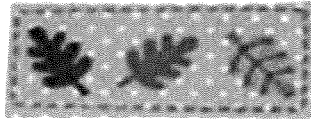
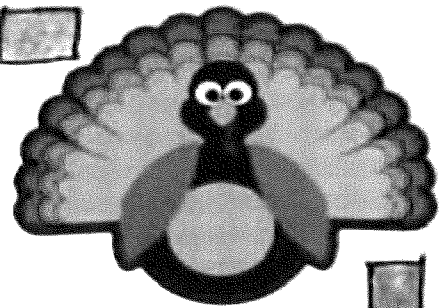

Dear Friends in Christ,

Many of us will gather either on Thanksgiving Eve or Thanksgiving Day for a special worship service to give thanks to God.

But wait. This year, Iowa has had over 125 tornadoes and record flooding. Is this really a year to give thanks? We often think of Thanksgiving as a time to give thanks for what we have. Martin Luther emphasized the importance of gratitude in his teachings about thanksgiving. In his explanation of the First Article of Apostles Creed, Luther writes that everything we have — our body, soul and possessions — are gifts from God.

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth.

What does this mean? I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them.

He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life.

He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil.

All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me.

For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him.

This is most certainly true.

Thanksgiving begins not with what we have, but rather with God. “I believe” is a statement of faith. God has made you and me and that alone means we are of great value to Him and to one another. He is the one who has given us our bodies, and He is the one who takes care of them. It is a work and a blessing from God. It is not just a general fact that He takes care of us in a general way. Luther gets specific. He reminds us that God takes care of even our eyes and ears. He goes on to remind us that God has given and takes care of our reason and all senses.

Luther next names those things we so often think of when we thank God. This is just a short list of all the people and possessions that God has given us. Luther reminds us that all material blessings come from God and should be used responsibly. This means we should use them wisely and for the benefit

of others, not just for our own gain. He reminds us that every aspect of our being and the world around us is a gift from God.

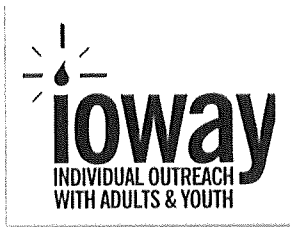
When Luther says, “He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life,” he is emphasizing God’s continuous and generous provision for our physical and daily needs. The term “richly” underscores the abundance and generosity of God’s provision. It means that God does not just give the bare minimum, but provides abundantly out of His goodness.

It is so important for us to be reminded that God not only takes care of our physical needs, but He is also the one who guards and protects us from all evil. It is such a comfort to know that God — the very creator of all things — is the one who is protecting us from evil. God is *always* present and *always* actively working to guard and protect us from evil.

God does all this for you and me because He wants to! It is by grace. He takes great delight in doing all this for you and me. This is certainly not because of anything we have done or not done. It all flows from the heart of a Father who loves us. God’s love is unconditional and is for you.

“For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him.” This is why we celebrate Thanksgiving. It is not so much about the blessings of the past year, but it is about God, who is always actively working *for you*.

“That’s mine! You can’t have it.” If you have kids, or ever were a kid, you are probably familiar with that phrase. Have you ever heard, “but we’ve never done things that way” in your church? “I don’t think that would work, so we probably shouldn’t try it” is a statement that I’ve heard quite a few times in my adult life when brainstorming ideas.

What about this? “Wouldn’t it be amazing if we worked together on (name your project or mission)?

Sometimes as churches, our humanistic sinful nature comes out and we tend to get a bit territorial about who, when, and how things may be progressing. And to be clear, I’m talking about our personal preferences, not the theology we share. I have witnessed recently several different examples of people coming together from different congregations, Lutheran schools, and youth groups to accomplish so much.

I am encouraging everyone to take a step outside their comfort zone and be prayerful about how you may be able to connect with others at an LCMS congregation near you.

Our first example is about Youth Connect in the Sioux City area. About 5-6 years ago during a Mercy Meals event held at Faith Lutheran the discussion was started by one of the youth leaders, Jen, with the others about the possibility of doing an area youth event several times a year. While the idea was intriguing, the timing seemed to not be a good fit, as the next step email responses were not stellar. “Flash Forward to 3 years ago when Faith Lutheran was sharing pastors with Calvary Lutheran. My own daughter and son became involved in their youth group and became close to many members of Calvary. By the time Faith had received our new pastor in 2022 I was ready to try again. I started with the same mass email that I had sent out a few years prior. This time it was well received! I think it was just a matter of God’s timing more than anything I did to influence the interest. Prayers were answered!”

Youth Connect continues to meet frequently in the Sioux City area and there are many positive results from this purposeful working together. “I think it is easy for our kids to feel discouraged when they are alone as youth in their own churches. When we can pool all the kids together, they have a better outlook on the fact that there ACTUALLY ARE other kids that are practicing their faith and worshiping our Savior Jesus Christ. I hope it helps the youth feel more accepted as a follower of Christ. I like they are building their own little community of friends. Also, it is more fun for the kids to go to the District Gatherings when they know more people!” I spoke with a few of the Youth Connect group who attended the Senior High district event in October at Camp Okoboji. They agreed with Jen that it is a great group to be a part of, and it’s really helping to build their faith, friendships, and allowing them to have a solid foundation living out their beliefs in the world. “It’s a really good thing” according to one of the young men there.

One of the young ladies I spoke to said, “It’s really nice to already know people when you go to bigger events.”

Jen shared, “I love to have kids ask me when we will do a servant event again! They are excited to have done the work and are looking forward to doing it again! I think kids that serve, feel needed and appreciated. I don't think they even realize that serving others is a great defense against depression and even just the typical teenage blues. We are trying to balance fun activities like trampoline venues and country bonfire and hayrides with servant events. I like to have focus on powerful verses from scripture that we can relate to their lives. We show them God has a plan for them in His written word and then we talk about how that relates to their own lives.”

Jonathon Bailey, DCE at Redeemer, Sioux City, shared that it was really nice to come to IDW and have Youth Connect already functioning so well. It was great to have his youth groups connected in and be able to encourage and share in the growth that is happening. Also, it’s a helpful tool for smaller congregations and church youth leaders to not feel like they are alone.

We have so many ways to come together. And yes, sometimes it does mean taking a deep breath and feeling a bit uncomfortable with the change it may bring, but it’s most often quite worth it! Just consider finding another congregation near you that you could: join together in Bible study, have a potluck, do a youth or senior activity – or a combo with both age groups, reach out to families with young children to do a park day, do shared Advent/Lent services if your pastor is up for it, join your musicians and singers together for the fun of rehearsing or to put together an event, or do a service/mercy project. Let your creative ideas flow, pray, and be open to God working in ways you never expected.

How good and pleasant it is when God’s people live together in unity! Psalm 133:1
