'A Noble Note'

Hands are a very important part of our lives. You could even say that they are essential! Whether you're tightening a bolt, crocheting a scarf, or typing on a computer, there's so much that we do with our hands. The Greek physician Galen called our hands the instrument of instruments. Just think about all the ways we use our hands: our hands can be used to heal or hurt, to work or play, to build or break down, to hold or let go, and the list goes on and on. What a great gift God has given us in our hands, and the rest of our bodies! If that's how we view our human hands, how much more important are the Hands of the Lord! And so for our Lenten Midweek worship services, we'll be spending time reflecting on "The Hand of the Lord."

All throughout the Bible, God's hands are mentioned and our focus is drawn to them. In the Old Testament alone the hands of the Lord are mentioned over two hundred times! His hands are active in creation, they have ultimate power and control over everything that happens in the world, they deliver justice and judgment, and most importantly, they give us salvation.


The "hand of the Lord" was upon Ezekiel when He gave him a vision (Ezekiel 3:22), and the "hand of the Lord" was against the Philistines in the days of Samuel (1 Samuel 7:13). The hand of the Lord is both Law and Gospel.

What is surprising though is that specific references to the "hand of the Lord" are not all that frequent in the New Testament. But here's why: The One through whom all things were created and cared for entered into His own creation and took on real, literal hands in His incarnation (John 1:1–14). We have many examples within the New Testament that speak of the way that Jesus used His hands alongside His life-giving words to bring us forgiveness, life, and salvation.

The work of Christ's hands help us to see the merciful and personal way that He comes to us. Jesus used His hands to save drowning Peter, to feed the 5,000, to touch those who were unclean, to stop a funeral procession in its tracks, to lift up Jairus's daughter, and to bless the little children. The hand of the Lord has personally come to us in Jesus! It might be weird to think about it, but God has hands, real hands! And through those hands, Jesus has accomplished all that we need. Amazingly, He takes our manipulative, distorted, self-serving hands and restores them into useful hands for His purposes; to literally use them in service to our neighbors and to spiritually make our whole lives His instruments of witness, service, and praise. So come join us these next few Wednesdays during Lent as we marvel at the Hands of the Lord!




EVENING CIRCLE

Dear Friend in Christ,

I remember as a child when my brother and I had been naughty, my mother saying those dreaded words, "just wait until you father gets home!" That time of waiting was worse than any punishment my mother could have meted out. It was filled with fear, guilt, and anxiety because of the unknown. Just waiting for my father to come home, what would he say, or what even more, would my dad do?! Would there be any escape from this dreaded punishment? If only someone would intercede for us. If only someone would put in a good word for us and direct our father to forgive us. If there is only someone in our father's house who understands us.

The good news is there is such a person in our Father's house above. The disciples of Jesus were often like my brother and I, filled with fear, guilt, and anxiety. Jesus had just told them He would be leaving them. What would this mean? They had been following Him for three years; how could they possibly go on without Him? Jesus spoke words of comfort to them and to us. "Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also. And you know the way to where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you had known me, you would have known my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him" (John 14:1-7 ESV).

Jesus goes to our Father's house for us. Jesus knows who we are, and He knows the fear, guilt, and anxiety we feel living outside of our Father's house. He knows the fear of judgement we feel because of our acts of rebellion against His good and gracious will. He knows our guilt we feel when we have hurt others by what we've said and done. Jesus understands our anxiety when we're faced with things that are suddenly out of our control. Jesus understands the anxiety that we feel as we grow older, and our physical bodies begin to wear out. Jesus knows the sadness we face the death of loved ones. Jesus comes into our world filled with fear, guilt and anxiety and comforts us by saying "In my Father's house there are many rooms...! go there to prepare a place for you."

This is really good news for you and me. We know that Jesus has prepared a place for us. He prepared this place by all that He's done for us. It is by His life, death, and resurrection. He has made you and me ready to enter our Father's home knowing that it is a place for us. All our fears and anxieties that stem from a guilty conscious and make us afraid to step into the holy presence of our

heavenly Father, can be put to rest. Jesus is the One who intercedes for us. Jesus is the One who has made us ready when our Father calls us home.

Blessing Boxes – Consider building a Blessing Box from scratch, from a prefab cabinet, or a repurposed piece of furniture to have on your property for the community. I would encourage that donations come into your church/school and someone checks them for expiration dates

and safety before going in the box. It can be a great intergenerational project to fill several times a month! Keep it updated with non-perishables, hygiene items, winter hats/mittens, books, etc.


